Notice Under Section 62 (3) Of Marine and Coastal Area (Takutai Moana) Act 2011 To Applicants for Customary Marine Title

#### Tēna koe

New Zealand Steel (NZ Steel) understands that you have made an application for customary marine title or protected customary right under section 62(3) of the Marine and Coastal Area (Takutai Moana) Act 2011 in the area relevant to the Glenbrook Steel Mill (the Manukau Harbour, and in particular the Waiuku channel).

We wish to notify and seek your views in relation to a resource consent application that will be lodged for the ongoing operations of the Steel Mill, located at Glenbrook. The application will seek to replace existing consents for its water discharge to and occupation of, the Coastal Marine Area (CMA). These existing consents are due to expire in late 2021.

Since 1968 the Steel Mill has operated on the eastern bank of the Waiuku River, which is a long and relatively narrow tidal arm of the Manukau Harbour. The NZ Steel application, currently being prepared, will address the following activities within the CMA:

- Discharge of treated process water and stormwater into the coastal marine area, from the existing Northside Outfall;
- Discharge of treated process water and stormwater into the coastal marine area, from the existing Southside Outfall;
- Occupation of part of the coastal marine area by the existing Southside Outfall discharge structure, which is located just seaward of mean high water springs.

Renewing these consents will ensure that the Steel Mill is able to continue its well established operations. The NZ Steel business is essential for the local and national community contributing significantly by:

- Creation of over 4000 jobs (directly and indirectly) within Auckland and the wider area;
- Providing over \$600 million per annum to the New Zealand economy;

For every tonne of steel produced in New Zealand, 80% of the dollars spent on that steel stay within New Zealand, compared to only 5% of the dollars spent on imported steel.
