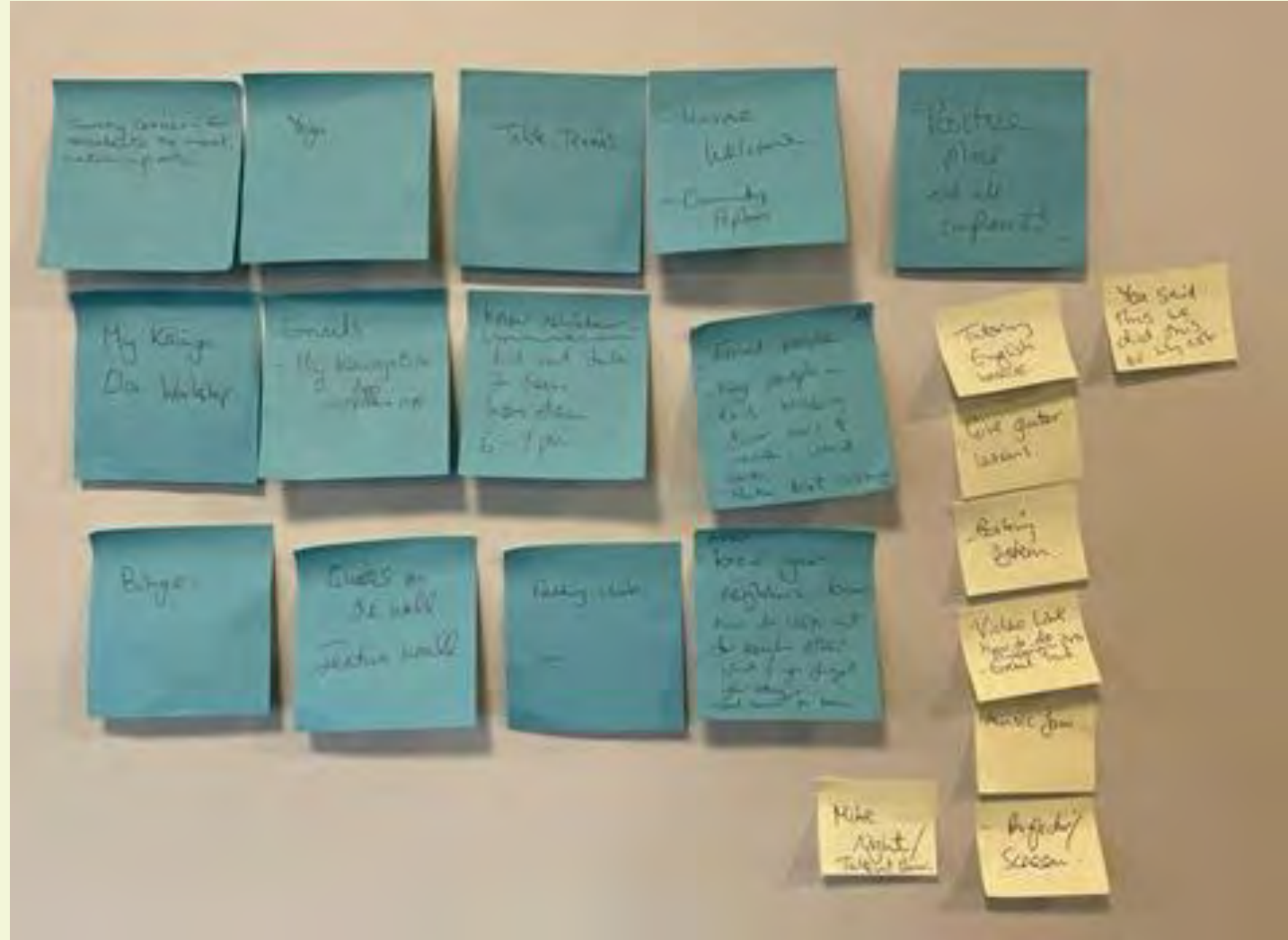

Getting to know Te Ara Awataha



Northcote's new greenway is named after and follows the path of the original Awataha Stream. The 1.5km greenway forms a network of parks, public spaces, and shared cycling and walking paths through the heart of Northcote that provide a safe and healthy environment for people, plants, and wildlife.

The project has been a community-led regeneration in partnership between Kāinga Ora, Kaipātiki Project, Eke Panuku, mana whenua, Auckland Council's Healthy Waters, and the Kaipātiki Local Board.

The Northcote community has played a leading role in helping to design the greenway, restoring and daylighting the Awataha Stream, and planting hundreds of trees to create a sense of community ownership and guardianship now and into the future.

Eke Panuku Development Auckland is revitalising the heart of Northcote to transform the neighbourhood into a vibrant, welcoming hub where community, culture and business thrives. From 2027 onwards, you'll start to see an upgraded, sustainably designed town centre, with new homes, shops and eateries, a multi-purpose community hub and a larger supermarket.

The new community hub is planned to enrich the town centre, working with the existing heritage-listed library to create a new multi-purpose hub, offering library and community services for locals to use and enjoy.
