# DRAFT REFRESHED KAIPĀTIKI CONNECTIONS PLAN

Parks and Places Specialist August 2024

# Background

- The Kaipātiki Local Board's approved work programme for 2020/2021 and 2021/2022. included the item 'Refresh the Kaipātiki Connections Plan' at a total cost of \$40K.
- At the Kaipātiki Local Board workshop in September 2020, a project working group was initiated and have met regularly to provide guidance.
- Evolved over several financial years as council responded to the impacts of Kauri Dieback Disease, changes to the pedestrian/cycling network, storm damage and responses to the public engagement phase of the Kaipatiki Local Parks Management Plan.
- At the June 2022 Kaipātiki Local Board workshop the first draft of the plan was reviewed.
- The focus on prioritisation of cycling and walkways projects in the previous connections plan has been removed from the refreshed plan. This undertaken separately through the Kaipātiki Local Board Work Programme process, informed by 'storm recovery' and Kauri Dieback Disease prioritisation workshops.

# Context

The key areas where the new plan differed from the previous plan include:

- The Auckland Transport (AT) vision for on-road cycleways are now provided through the AT 'Future Connect' web page.
- Alternative 'green routes' have been proposed that utilise both parks and on-road connections
- A separate category for pedestrian and cycle routes in the larger bush reserves is identified in the plan named 'Bush Tracks'.
- The plan also identifies those tracks which are suitable for supporting the users to access the wider transport network, and those that are primarily provided to connect visitors with the natural environment.
- A second category of walkway/cycleway routes is proposed in the plan named 'Paths'. These are generally located in less ecologically sensitive reserves. These routes are developed using alternative planning processes which are aligned to council, AT and AustRoads design standards

# Local Board Feedback

- Improvements to aspects of the style, layout, and route colour coding in the mapping
- More clarity on how the current on-road cycle routes are shown in the mapping.
- 'Greenway' routes that connect a series of parks together should be clearly identified.
- The proposed walkway that generally follows the western coastline around Beachaven, Birkenhead and Northcote should be identified as a separate category.
- There should be a separate category for some bush tracks that provide a more challenging walking environment for visitors.
- Further engagement with the volunteer groups associated with each key bush reserve should be undertaken and their feedback incorporated into a final version of the plan.
- Kauri dieback related tracks don't need to be identified in this plan as this information is now available through Auckland Council's Kauri Dieback mapping portal.
- The latest draft connections plan document should be made available as part of the public engagement process for the LPMP.

# **Key Changes Implemented**

- Improvements to style, layout and route colour coding.
- On-road cycle routes are shown in the map with improved legibility.
- 'Greenway' routes that connect a series of parks together are identified with a light green hatching.
- The proposed Beach Haven, Birkenhead and Northcote coastal route has been added as a separate category denoted with a light blue line colour coding.
- A third category for 'Bush Tracks' that enables a more challenging walking environment for visitors has been added.
- A hyperlink to the Kauri Dieback mapping portal information available through Auckland Council's website has also been added to the document.
- Engagement with the volunteer groups associated with each key bush reserve has been undertaken and their feedback incorporated into this final version.




