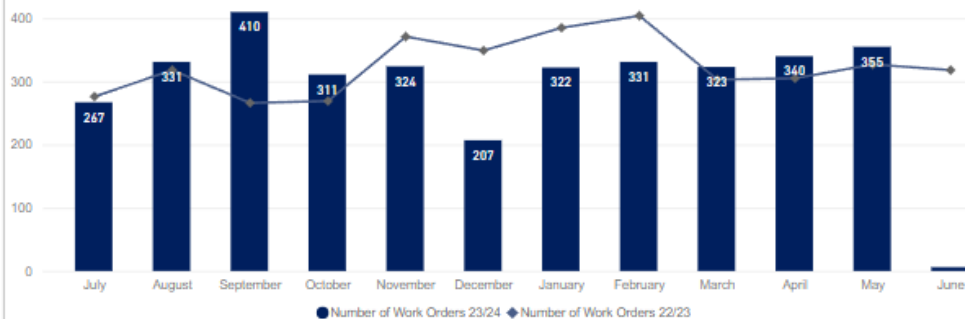

COMMENTARY

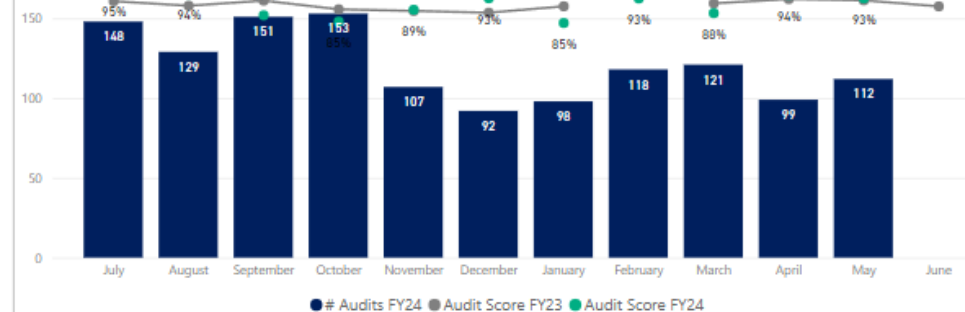
Requests for service for the month of May reflected a slight increase from the same period the previous year, with a total of 355.

Electrical maintenance with the second highest number of requests scoring 37 for the month of May. This could be in relation to the cooler weather heading into winter, with requests to check heating and lighting issues.

Structure maintenance and repairs requests for service are now starting to decrease as our contractors work through the building works identified in the previous saturation audits undertaken in our built space in 2023.

Restoring Nature in Laingholm

TE KITENGA NA DAN – TUAWHA / DAN'S DISCOVERY #4 KAURI SNAILS / PUPURANGI (*PARYPHANTA BUSBYI*)

I was walking through a place in Laingholm where wetlands meet the forest, and I came across something that I could only describe as a kauri snail mecca. In the short time I was searching, I found four live snails, and at least six empty shells.

The kauri snail (*Paryphanta busbyi*), or pupurangi, is a large carnivorous land snail endemic to New Zealand. Despite their name, they actually prefer areas that are damp with fertile soils and plenty of earthworms, things that kauri forests aren't really known for. The name pupurangi comes from the Maori word pupu, meaning snail, and rangi meaning heavenly. They are a taonga and a protected species.

I was in awe of some of the large snails that I found. They can grow to the size of a fist and live up to 20 years or older, so it was crazy to think that some of them were older than me. They are also highly mobile compared to other snails, although this still only adds up to moving about 10 metres every two weeks!

Figs, rats, hedgehogs and possums are huge threats to pupurangi because they all eat them up en masse, including their eggs, and that's not the only threat; humans also put them at risk through habitat destruction or by directly interfering with them. Sadly, the snails living in the place where I found them are at serious risk because I also saw pig prints in the mud. Yes, wild pigs are in Laingholm! I'm going to see if we can find a way to give this area better protection.

Now I must come clean - I had a motive behind this topic. When I discovered this spot, I also came upon a large pile of empty shells that had been collected by someone. Collecting pupurangi shells is a problem because they are the ultimate recycling machines. They need those shells. When a pupurangi dies, other snails chow down on its leftover shell to take in calcium



carbonate (which is surprisingly hard to come by in the bush). This is important because it helps the snail to grow a strong, thick shell. So when people take shells from where they are found, other snails living nearby will find it harder to grow healthy shells putting them more at risk from predation.

Safe travels and good luck with your own discoveries over winter.

Community planting day gave us the opportunity to celebrate National Volunteer Week, and this year we nominated Katharine Paton, our happily retired scientist and lab manager, as our Volunteer Tu Meke 2024. For the past five years, Kathy has donated many, many volunteer hours to caring for the health and well being of the Laingholm Stream. Every month, working from a very orderly little laboratory laid out in the boot of her car, she has collected water samples and tested them; and every day, she has measured our local rainfall using a gauge in her garden. Not only that, she also uploads all that wonderful data onto the WaiCare website. It's not often that small groups like ours can build and share such a long history of record keeping. Thank you very much for all your hard work Kathy, you really are Tu Meke!

Last month we held our 5th annual Community Planting Day at Western Park on Western Road. Big hugs to everyone who turned up with their spades to get everything planted in time for the winter rains. Thanks also to our Auckland Parks Ranger who provided 150 native plants and a big bunch of sausages to sizzle. We really appreciate all the support, it keeps us motivated and the results are there for all to see. The park is looking amazing now that many of the original plantings have matured.

We hope to see you all again at next year's planting day.

In April, we were shocked to find that Vector had cut down a very tall nikau in the park that was probably about 60 years old. Laingholm's ranger was also upset about it, and Vector apologised for the mistake by planting five large sized nikau as replacements. Sadly, we can't bring back one of the park's oldest landmarks, but the new stand of nikau are growing strong and we're very happy to have them.

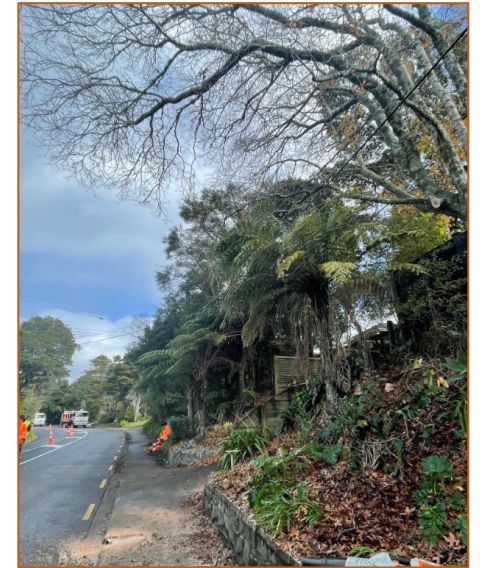

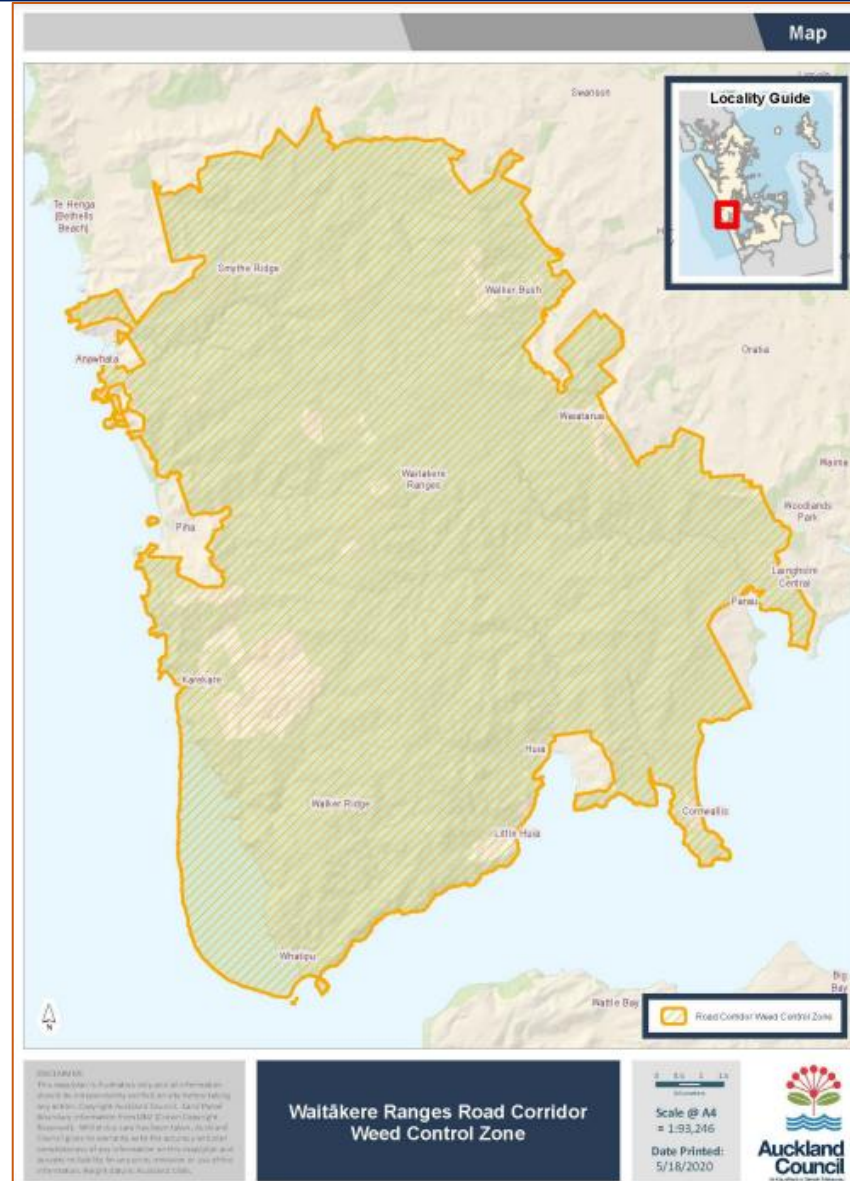
Road corridor Regional Pest Management Plan compliance

Last month, specialist local contractor Extreme Height delivered an impressive 1,124 hours (140.5 person days) working on achieving compliance with the operative Regional Pest Management Plan ‘good neighbour’ rules regarding the extensive road corridor network within the Waitakere Ranges ‘weed corridor zone’.

Compliance requires control, sometimes at height, of the following ten species within the road corridor:

- Agapanthus
- Climbing asparagus
- Bushy asparagus
- Formosa lily
- Ginger
- Gorse
- Moth plant
- pampas
- Rhamnus
- Woolly nightshade

Delays in start-of-season procurement and getting approval for the traffic management plan delayed works, but we anticipate full delivery of planned works by the end of financial year.

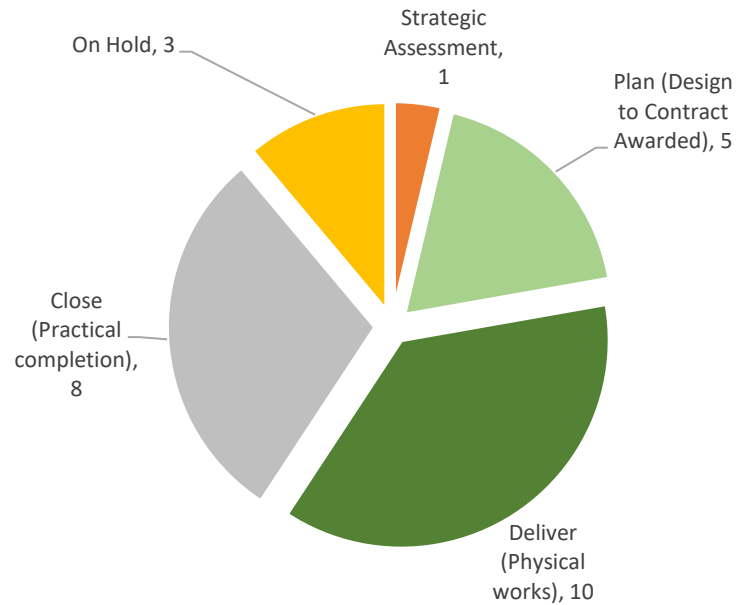

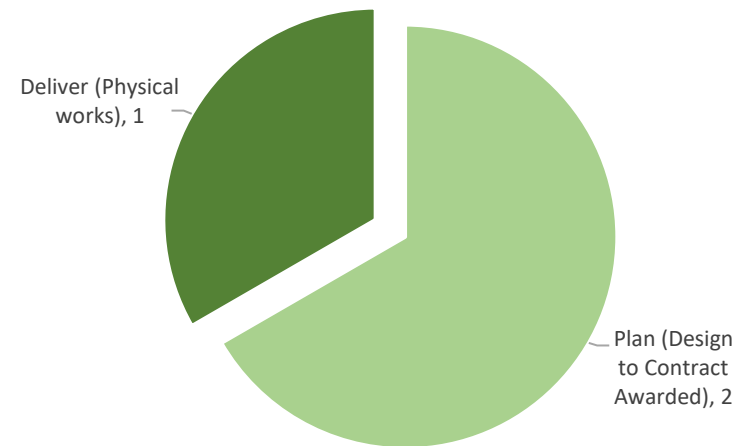

Learning about composting, gardening, irrigation, plant pest and diseases, plant propagation to reduce costs through cuttings, layering and dividing, cooking and recipe sharing. Physical activities done safely, Social events for the local residents, food sharing. Social engagement and keeping an idea on our local residents. An interesting site for local children to visit. Community messaging about recycling and re-using where possible. Companionship for people who live alone, outing for those living in a retirement village now but who were co-founders of the garden. One plot has a family member with a disability requiring wheel-chair access.

- Removes the barriers (transport, cost, supervision) that exist for at-risk and disadvantaged youth in the Waitakere Ranges Local Board from attending an iconic Auckland recreational activity
- Builds positive relationships between the police and youth, their whanau and community, removing any existing stereotypes that may exist

- Connects student leaders with at-risk and disadvantaged youth allowing for pro-social mentoring relationships to develop both at the event and post event.

Maori are over-represented in disadvantaged statistics and at-risk statistics for young people.

Maori youth are therefore, a key group for Blue Light when distributing tickets in collaboration with community groups and local schools. Over 60% of the youth Blue Light works with identify as Maori or Pacifica and Blue Light's staff reflects the diversity of the communities we work with.

Accessible to people with disabilities

Yes - Youth and Whanau experiencing disability will be able to participate in the Rainbow's End Fundays as Rainbows End is a fully accessible recreational facility and a member of The International Association of Amusement Parks (IAAPA). Rainbow's End has specific communications on its website detailing this for any youth or whanau who have concerns about their ability to participate in the Fundays. Blue Light's medical forms and RAMs prior to the event detail processes and procedures for youth and whanau experiencing disability attending the event.

Healthy environment approach:

Promote smoke-free messages, Include waste minimisation (zero waste) messages, Healthy options for food and drink, including water as the first choice

Blue Light promotes smoke-free messages in its branding and marketing (all media including social media, communication to schools, communication by police and volunteers). Rainbows End is a smoke free venue and this is also promoted at the venue. Waste minimisation messages are promoted by Blue Light at the venue and in the use of resources on the day. Blue Light provides the food and water ensuring healthy options are chosen.

Does your project support any genders, ages or ethnicities specifically?

Blue Light's Rainbow's End Fundays target years 7,8 and 9 from primary schools, intermediates and colleges/high schools with a decile rating of 5 or less - as a very rough measure of reaching disadvantaged and at-risk populations. We then work with these schools to identify the individual students who would benefit most from the Fundays, along with referrals from our Blue Light Branches, Police Youth Aid Officers, and community groups.

In the key year groups targeted, students are usually aged between 11 and 14 years old. They are usually aged 11 and 12 in year 7, aged 12 and 13 in year 8 and aged 13 and 14 in year 9.

Blue Light's work in the community is unique - it is not a one size fits all approach. While no specific gender diverse groups have been targeted, nor are they excluded. Over 100,000 young people participate in Blue Light's programmes and activities annually making diversity and inclusion practices a priority. Our work-place policy and procedures reflect our commitment to diversity and inclusion.

Expertise:	Raukatauri has served as a model for music therapy practice and advocacy in Aotearoa New Zealand for the past 20 years. Our music therapists, who are qualified to at least degree level and are recognised professionals by Music Therapy NZ, are leaders in their field and are frequently asked to present at conferences, give media interviews, participate in research and submit work for publication. We host clinical internships for music therapy university students from New Zealand, Australia and the United States and also provide placements for Dance Movement Therapy, Speech Language Therapy and Child and Adolescent Psychotherapy Master's Degree students from the University of Auckland and AUT.

Music therapy is a relatively young practice in New Zealand, and yet emerged as a credentialed profession in the 1940s. It is widely used across the world not only in music therapy centres but also in hospitals, hospices, schools, rest homes etc. Despite being largely unknown here, its benefits and effectiveness is heavily supported by research, both in NZ and internationally, as well as

through our own annual and ongoing evaluations.

In their music therapy sessions, clients actively engage with a Registered Music Therapist through music improvised uniquely with them, as well as through favourite songs and musical activities. They interact and communicate with their therapist, expressing themselves in whatever musical way they can, working towards the individualised goals that have been developed in collaboration with their whānau, such as:

- improved communication, independence, self-confidence and awareness
- improved motor skills
- reduced isolation
- improved attention, learning and memory
- reduced anxiety and improved self-regulation

Our clients have a range of special needs, including cerebral palsy, autism, Down syndrome, traumatic brain injuries, dementia and mental health disorders. Whatever a client's need or ability, they are able to participate in our service. For those clients in wheelchairs, all of our locations are fully accessible, but our provisions go far beyond that. We have specially designed and made instruments that allow even those with the smallest range of movement to make music. Our staff specialize in working with people with disabilities, creating a warm, welcoming and inclusive environment for all.

Requesting grant for: We ask clients to pay weekly fees based on a recommended scale. To remove financial barriers to services these fees are heavily subsidised. With the salary costs to our music therapists, transportation expenses and rental for the space, the fees received from our clients do not cover our outgoings. We are therefore seeking funding towards these costs in Titirangi for one term (10 weeks). It is only through the support of grants such as this that we are able to truly achieve our mission of offering a quality, accessible music therapy service to all people, whatever their need.

If part funded, how would you make up the difference:

With the recent decline in grant funding covering our general operating costs we are no longer able to sustain programmes that operate at a loss. This is one such example, and our Trustees have decided should we not secure grant funding this satellite will need to close.

Cost of participation: Yes. While our cost per session is approximately \$160, whānau can pay as little as \$10 per session based on their self-reported ability to pay.

As Tāmaki Makaurau's only dedicated wild-bird hospital, our kaimahi(staff) regularly attend to migratory sea-birds, flying in from globally-affected regions. Therefore, we are at the frontline of such disease entry, and play an essential role in regional/national infection control. To address infectious-biological spread, the hospital urgently needs to erect non-permeable physical-containment walls to separate off wards. Although we have a dedicated external seabird room to use for quarantine, the new walls will create high-containment vs general ward enclosures within our hospital. We request \$1500 to aid this general-ward build (towards \$8277 quote), thereby protecting the birds and community of Waitākere and greater Auckland.</p>		
Expertise:	<p>Our General Manager, previously an avian-team leader at Auckland Zoo, has expertise in managing/quarantining birds with infectious biosecurity risks. Our collaborator, Dr. Miller (WildWays NZ, and former GM) was trained in environmental-hazard containment- and was deployed for three major US hurricanes, and oil spills- including Deep Water Horizon. BirdCare Aotearoa has three dedicated staff-veterinarians, who manage the annual 6,000+ wild bird caseload, and frontline training programs. They are recognised as worldleaders in responding to botulism-impacted birds, including training other national agencies/field teams to manage these events. Our whanau also include three postdoctoral scientists (trained and worked with the University of Auckland), with expertise in animal handling, and mitigating spread of microbial pathogens and biosecurity risks.</p>

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

The urgent provision of funding to build containment walls within the BirdCare Aotearoa Hospital General ward, will enable the 120 kaimahi (staff, and mahi aroha-volunteers), 28% residing within the Waitakere catchment, to maintain resilience against infectious diseases, and minimise the risk of spreading disease-causing microbes throughout the community. This would immediately mitigate the effects of bird-borne infections (e.g., Avian influenza H5N1) spreading to our core whanau and also the compassionate public or agencies that bring in bird-patients. Note, 19% of bird-patients originate from the WRLB rohe, with our coastlines being habitats for migratory seabirds. By building containment walls, with non-permeable materials for easy sanitation with chemical disinfectants, the existing hospital general ward will be physically separated from high containment areas (pic-attached). Thus, preventing infections from spreading to kaimahi and mahi aroha volunteers, or other wild birds (including taonga species), and the wider community. This project also reflects the continued development of close, coordinated working relationships between BirdCare Aotearoa, mana whenua, DOC, MPI, Auckland Council, and other agencies to ensure sick wildlife are managed humanely and appropriately. Although this project prioritises human safety, and the welfare of our avian patients, the prevention of wide-scale infection-spread will significantly benefit Aotearoa's agricultural industries.

BirdCare Aotearoa are committed to honouring the rich history, mātauranga (knowledge) and kaitiakitanga (guardianship) of tangata whenua. BirdCare Aotearoa are located within the heartland of the iwi Te Kawerau ā Maki. However, as our mahi (work) covers ngā manu (birds) across Tāmaki Makaurau, we are strengthening relationships with all 19 iwi authorities. Our mahi is renowned for manaakitanga (compassion), and caring for Papatūānuku (the Earth mother), Ranginui (the Sky father), and their children Tāne Mahuta (God of forests and birds) and Tangaroa (God of wai (water), in seas, lakes and rivers). Therefore, our works complement tikanga-based approaches that recognise

the wairua and mauri of te taiao (the spirit and life force in all elements of nature).

Accessible to people with disabilities

Yes - This project is accessible for people of all abilities. We are committed to ensuring that our mahi is inclusive, and will consult/ work with any concerned individuals to support their participation.

Healthy environment approach:

Promote smoke-free messages, Include waste minimisation (zero waste) messages, Encouraging active lifestyles including movement or fitness programmes, Encourage the reduction of carbon emissions or increase community resilience to the impacts of climate change*

*Smoke-free: BirdCare Aotearoa is a 100% smoke-free site, as needed for the welfare of birds. Smokers are asked to exit the premises, for smoking activities away from aviaries.

*Waste minimisation: This project will separate the general ward from the bird-food preparation kitchen area. This immediately eliminates the waste of bird feed, in the case of suspected contamination by bird-borne diseases. We also promote food waste-composting, recycling, and separate soft-plastic waste to return to dedicated facilities. Finally, we regularly reuse materials beyond their primary utility.

*Healthy dietary options: Beyond this project, BirdCare Aotearoa provides healthy/sustainabl

e snacks & drink options for whanau breaks in the tearoom.

*Encouraging active lifestyles: 98% of our avian patients are brought in by members of the community, describing their discovery of the patients while spending time in active pursuits outdoors (e.g., walking, hiking, cycling).

Further, as the rehabilitation mahi requires

our kaimahi to walk between wild bird aviaries in our expansive outdoor premises, we encourage active lifestyles within their occupation.

*Encourage the reduction of carbon emissions or increase community resilience to the impacts of climate change: While our avian patients typically arrive by car, we reduce subsequent carbon emissions where possible, by coordinating post-rehabilitation soft releases onsite, within our expansive outdoor habitat areas (e.g., rakau/ native plant areas vs shoreline). Note, for territorial species or those requiring specialist release conditions (e.g., Cook's petrels need elevation and windy environments to take flight), the post-rehabilitation release involves driving a few birds at a time- thereby reducing carbon emissions, with all mileage recorded. Further, as many of the wild bird species we attend to have established ecological niches in seed dispersal and pollination, their successful rehabilitation and release extensively contributes to the growth of carbon-sequestering plant species. On the other hand, the arrival of many infectious pathogens from remote global sites reflects the impacts of climate change. The containment/ isolation practises detailed herein will improve our facilities, empowering BCA to significantly mitigate future disease spread through our wider community, and throughout Tamaki Makaurau, and nationally. Importantly, we can minimise the spread of infectious agents to taonga endemic and native birds, and agricultural industries that are essential to Aotearoa's emotional, social, and economic ora (welfare).

Does your project support any genders, ages or ethnicities specifically?

This project supports the inclusion of all genders, ages, and ethnicities of Tāmaki Makaurau. Indeed, our community of kaimahi (staff), mahi aroha (volunteers), and supporters reflect the diverse peoples of the Waitakere range, and wider Tāmaki Makaurau. Notably, we see greater female participation (of staff, volunteers, and supporter community, 79%). We also have ~3% identifying as gender diverse, which is greater than the 0.5% identified across Aotearoa in the 2021 Stats NZ Household Economic Survey.

We note however, that the improvements of containment, through isolation of general ward areas will be of

particular

benefit to individuals in our community with immune deficiencies, thereby reducing their risk of acquiring direct or indirect infections through BirdCare Aotearoa's mahi with seabirds.

Note, this heightened microbial defence/ disease resilience is very significant for the 14% of our volunteers are aged 60+, and those who come from households with high-density living arrangements (for which we do not have current data). We do not collect demographic data from our supporters or members of the public who bring in birds, but these often include retired citizens, or families with very young children.

Requesting grant for: We request funding to support the erection of containment walls within our general ward area (\$8277, quote attached). We ask the Waitakere ranges and Waitemata local boards, from whose rohe we receive the greatest proportion of wild bird admissions, to kindly consider supporting this urgent containment/ isolation requirement. If the Local board are unable to meet the entire request, a grant-in-aid will greatly support the mahi, environmental, and community outcomes of our non-profit wild bird hospital.

If part funded, how would you make up the difference:

Any amount of funding will support this project. BirdCare Aotearoa is currently recovering from a fragile financial situation (4 year operating deficits), and we humbly ask the Waitakere local board to consider at least part funding this urgent need. We recently

appointed a new board of trustees, general manager, and fundraising manager to secure its sustainable operation. While the build presented herewith is expensive for our operating budget, it is imperative that we maintain the standards of hygiene and biosecurity for the health of our whanau, wider community, and wildlife. If part-funded, we will seek alternative funding, with potential delays.

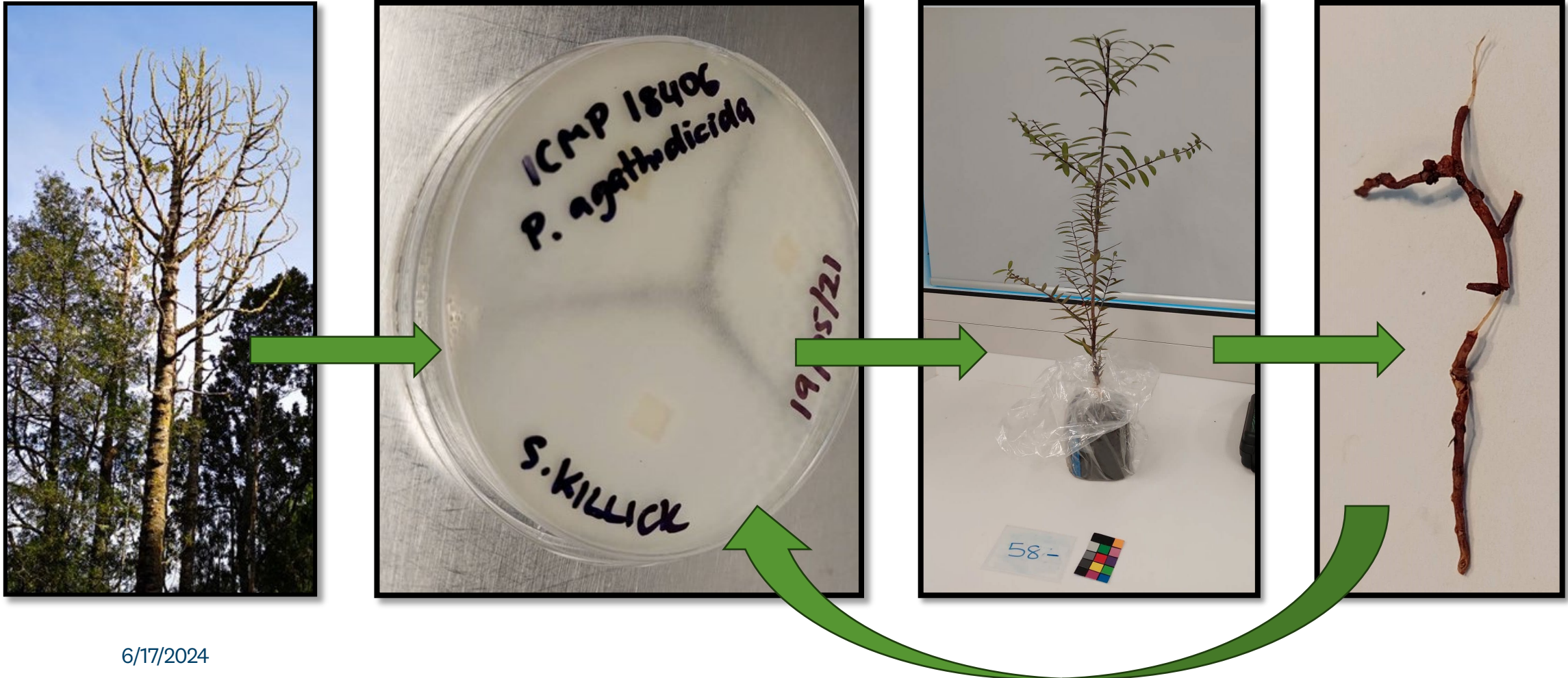

Kauri dieback disease – PA infection

How do we **know** what really causes kauri dieback disease?



Kauri dieback disease – PA infection



Does that mean every kauri that has PA infection looks sick?

No, because it takes time from becoming infected to showing symptoms, and some trees might be more resistant.

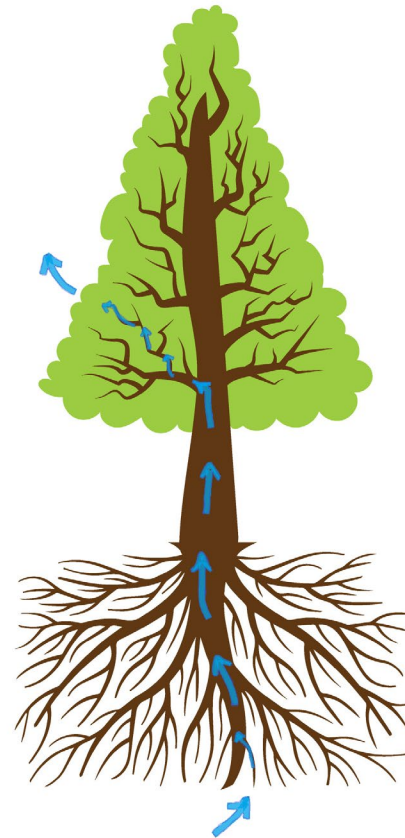
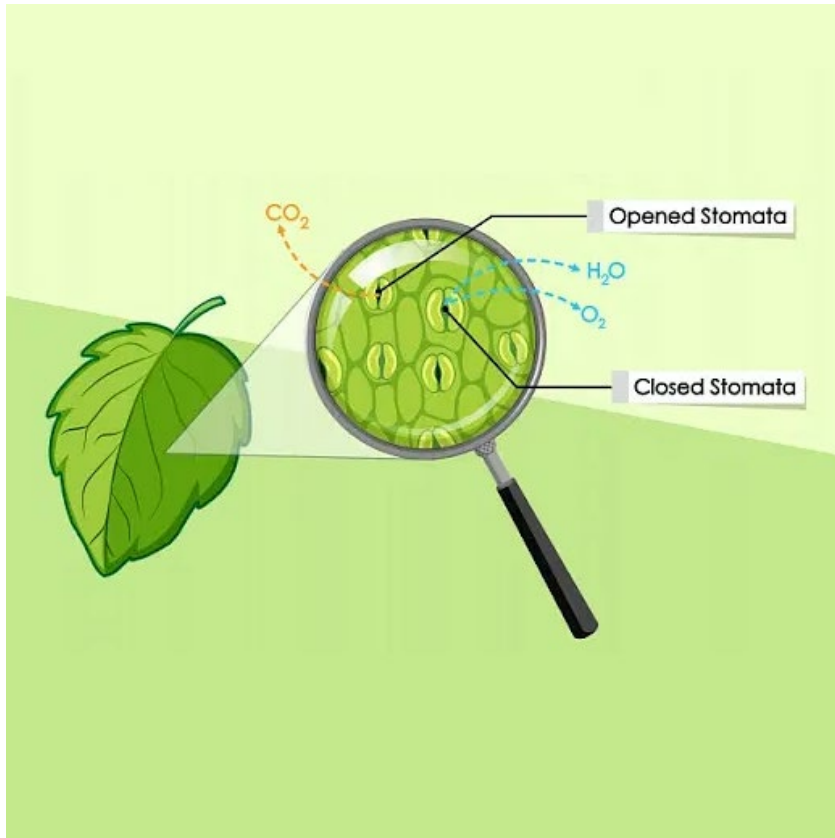
Can kauri dieback disease happen without PA?

No, but sometimes kauri can have the same symptoms. This is like how humans infected with the flu get really bad headaches, but there are lots of things that cause headaches. The symptom is useful as an indicator but testing is needed to identify the cause.



Kauri dieback disease – PA infection

What happens when a kauri is infected by *Phytophthora agathidicida*?



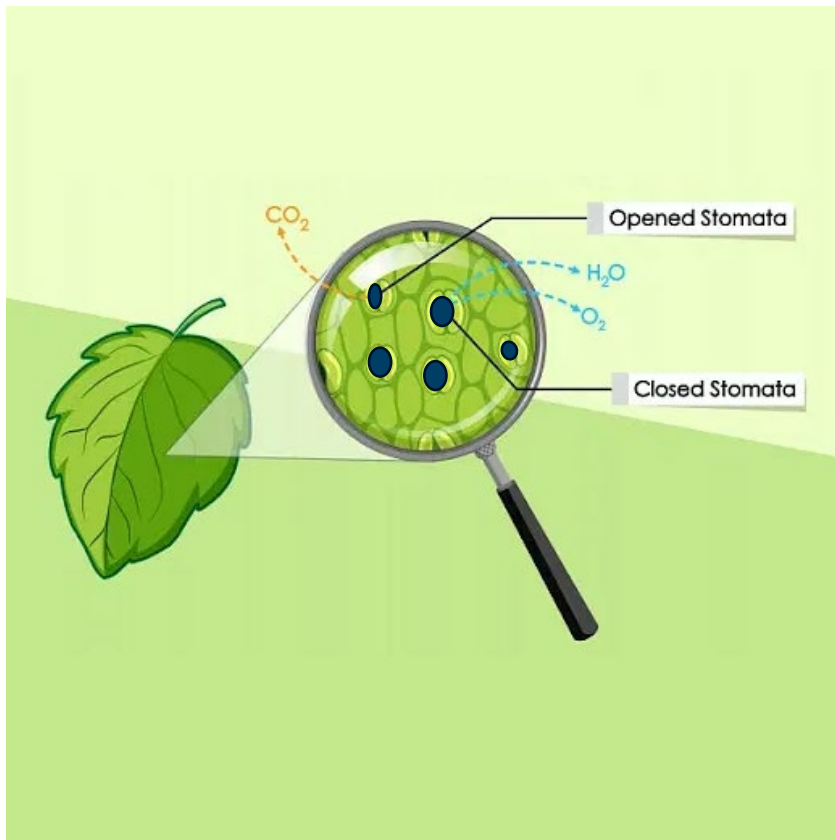
In a **healthy** kauri:

- Pores called stomata on the leaf let CO₂ in and water out
- The loss of one water molecule at the leaf pulls along another – this pulls water up the tree from the soil like a straw



Kauri dieback disease – PA infection

What happens when a kauri is infected by *Phytophthora agathidicida*?



After PA infection, kauri:

- Get root rot, cannot uptake as much water – drought stress
- Open their stomata so too much water is lost from the leaves
- Root rot travels up to the base of the stem = basal bleeding
- Leaves show drought stress symptoms

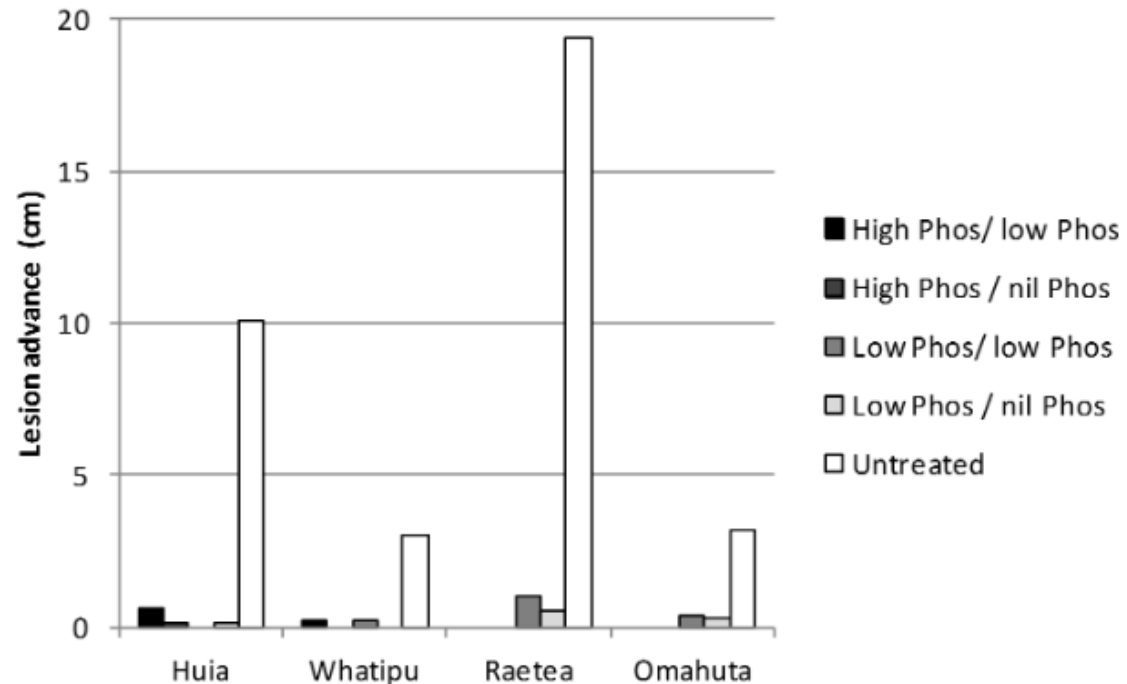
Research

- 4,690 published papers on phosphite and *Phytophthora*
- 97 published papers on phosphite on *P. agathidicida*

Effective at suppressing symptoms and keeping trees alive, but does not cure disease.

Phosphite treatment in kauri

Strategic decision-making considerations

- Phosphite **does** prolong the lives of infected kauri, but cannot cure infection.
- Treated trees will need to be re-treated to sustain effect, which can be costly
- There is currently insufficient evidence to show that phosphite treatment decreases amount of PA in soil
- PA in the Waitākere Ranges Regional Park is localised to outer edges, not everywhere
- While we cannot yet cure trees already infected, **we can prevent further spread**



Phosphite treatment in kauri

Strategic decision-making considerations

- Limited support of treatment (not every tree)
- Focus on projects that provide additional benefit, e.g. Research questions or community-based education
- Put the majority of our focus on preventing the spread of soil.
 - No PA = no need for phosphite = more trees and money saved!**
 - Track infrastructure upgrades
 - Hygiene stations
 - Risk minimisation through Kauri Dieback Management Plans
- Support research into longer-term tools

Hire subsidy – Glen Eden library room

- The local board allocated \$4000 for local community groups for free room hireage.
- All community groups that requested the hire subsidy in 2023/2024 received it.
- Of the 14 groups, only two community groups are based locally.
- There is no criteria for who should receive the subsidy.
- Library manager has been deciding on subsidy allocation.
- \$4000 didn't cover the full amount for 2023/2024.
- \$13 to hire the room per hour.
- Officers recommend for the local board to not fund the hire subsidy in 2024/2025.
- Officers will work with the library manager to support the local community groups that really need the room at a reduced rate and make sure it is for groups that are from the local community.
